

*This is the text of an article written after the death of Scott Cobb (1831-1862.) He was the son of Clark Cobb (1) and the uncle of Clark Cobb (2.) I have left spelling and capitalization as it is in the original.*

Bro. Scott Cobb is no more. He was the son of Stancil and Milia Cobb and was born in the State of Alabama Nov. 2, A D 1831. And was moved to Texas by his parents in 1834 and settled in Robertson County where he remained whith his parents he was married to Catharine Graham October 7, 1852 and possessed religion in 1857 and was baptized in the fellowship of the Baptist church of Christ at Shilo by the Venerable William Clark where he lived a pious and devoted Christian until the day of his death, he bore his sickness with great Christian fortitude and on the 27<sup>th</sup> day of May 1862 he fell asleep in the arms of his blessed redeemer and he has gone to that home from whence no traveler returns and leaves behind him to mourn his loss an affectionate wife and four children and an aged mother and seven brothers and sisters and a large circle of friends and acquaintances but they weep not as those that has no hope for if we believe that Jesus died and rose again them also that sleep in Jesus will God bring with him with Palms of victory in their hands and crowned of everlasting glory upon their heads.

1. Resolved that in the death of Bro. Scott Cobb the Church has lost one of her brightest gems and his wife a kind and effectionate husband and his children a tender father and his mother a beloved son and his brothers and sister a kind and affectionate brother and the community a good citizen.
2. Resolved that we deeply sympathize with his bereaved wife and friend but we bow in humble submission to the will of the Lord believing that he is too wise to err and too good to do wrong.
3. Resolved that a copy of this habituary be presented to his wife and that this habituary be spread upon the minutes of the church book
